


The Ontario Art Book Fair is organized by the City of Ontario, Museum, Arts & Culture Department with support from the Ontario City Library.

WELCOME

We are pleased to welcome you to the first ever Ontario Art Book Fair taking place at the Ontario Museum of History & Art. This free one-day event showcases regional artists' books, catalogues, monographs, periodicals, and zines. The Museum opens its art galleries to fifty exhibitors including publishing houses, independent press collectives, artists, zine-makers, printmakers, and individuals practicing in experimental paper formats. The Ontario Art Book Fair places the unique history and perspectives of the creative community of the Inland Empire of Southern California in conversation with the West Coast at large.

Over the past two decades, art book fairs have become a wide-spread concept for distribution of the self-publishing scene. This unique setting allows for working artists to discuss artistic concepts and writings in an open forum with community members and boost the creative economy, while celebrating the unique practice zine and art book making. Artist books and zines are works of art in book form. The medium is chosen for its creative freedom and its emphasis on craftsmanship demonstrating unique paper folding and book binding techniques. By nature, the art book is a tactile experience and creates an immediate connection with the viewer by putting artwork directly in their hands. Artist books and zines may cover any topic of focus to its creator. Because of wide thematic variations, art book fairs embody curiosity and discovery.

The Ontario Art Book Fair is a space where everyone is welcome. Whether you are discovering art books and zines for the first time, or adding to your personal collection of unique printed ephemera, the fair offers the opportunity to shop hundreds of unique artist editions, participate in hands-on book binding workshops, or learn more about the origin of zines and their impact on DIY culture.


Thoughts & Printers with Artist, Willis Salomon

Domenico Foschi was born in Bari, Italy, in 1962. He found the expressive power of the work of Alvin Langdon Coburn, Kertesz, Steichen, Stieglitz, Strand, Sander, Penn, Avedon and others, of pivotal importance to his direction as a photographer. Working for Sergio Guidetti, he received training on the use of large format cameras, film developing, and printing techniques. He then worked as a freelance photographer in Ravenna, his hometown, shooting for local magazines, newspapers, the City Administration, and political parties. Soon he realized that commercial photography wasn't going to allow him to explore photography in a more personal way. Foschi moved to the U. S. in 1989. Here he produced many different projects ranging from portraits to urban landscapes, still life, street photography, etc. His commercial work took a direction on his	36

own, mainly by producing CD covers for recording artists and commissioned portraiture.

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Erin Younger is an illustrator and writer based in L.A. County. She started making zines as a way to stay creative after her post art school burn out. She credits zines and the zine making community with helping her find her creative voice again. Inland Empire California Writers Club The Inland Empire California Writers Club (IECWC) has been a writing beacon for established and prospective writers in the local community since 1999. The IECWC serves as one of twenty-two branches to the California Writers Club, one of the oldest and largest writing clubs in America. With the collective mission of educating and supporting writers, their motto is, 'Writers Helping Writers.' The club features a monthly publication showcasing member talents in poetry, short stories, flash fiction, and more. Open mic sessions, writing workshops, and a critique group are just some of their offerings. The club conducts branch meetings at Ontario's very own Ovitt Family Community Library, typically on the fourth Saturday of each month.	47
Jillian Sandell is an artist, writer, and educator living and working in Joshua Tree, a rural desert community in southern California. In 2016, at the age of 50, a cancer diagnosis nudged open a creative door that has evolved into a sustained practice in printmaking, drawing, risograph, watercolor, zines, mixed-media, and collaborative community projects. Before becoming an artist, Sandell taught gender studies for two decades and her work is shaped by a feminist sensibility – focusing on the politics of everyday life, including the aftermath of cancer treatment, living in the desert, environmental and food justice, grief, and love, and community engagement and collaboration. She is an active member of the Morongo Basin art community, and has shown her work in galleries, community spaces, and zine fests around the US southwest.	6
Jim Cokas' printmaking and art making practices are closely tied to his writing practice, primarily poetry. Cokas is constantly looking for ways to combine the visual image with the written word. He creates and publishes editions of broadsides, unique artist books, and zines. He writes poetry that is about place, not just a physical location but where a place might reside in a person, and how that residency affects a person emotionally and intellectually. His poetry is always experience-based, direct, and relatable. Uyioghosa Aibangbee (A.L.O.U) As a photographer, Uyioghosa Aibangbee initially struggled with the constraints of formal photography rules, feeling confined by the traditional boundaries of composition and technique. Over time, Aibangbee realized that their creativity flourished when they let go of these conventions, embracing the freedom to explore more fluid and unconventional approaches. This shift led them to a more abstract style, where their focus on capturing emotions, textures, and movement, rather than strict visual accuracy. Today, their work reflects a dynamic blend of artistic expression and raw, unfiltered creativity, inviting viewers to see the world through a different lens.	32

worksheet.xyz explores iridescence and structural coloration through screen printing with mica-based inks on black paper, creating chameleon-like prints that shift in color depending on the viewer's perspective and the light source. These works engage with the tension between perception and materiality, transforming static images into dynamic, evolving experiences. Through a process that reflects our hybrid reality, worksheet investigates image transmission as a means of constructing reality. Blurring boundaries between physical and digital, organic and artificial, these works illuminate the liminal spaces between nature and infrastructure. Drawing from California's landscapes, they operate within a hyper-surreal, queer, and otherworldly aesthetic—inviting critique, imagination, and wonder—prompting viewers to reconsider the structures that shape their daily lives and the possibilities of what could exist beyond them.



ZERO+ Publishing

ZERO+ Publishing was launched in 2009 by Kirk Pedersen with his first book, Urban Asia. From its inception, ZERO+ established a manifesto of sorts—it would publish limited editions that would never be reprinted, using the finest paper and printing methods available, and most importantly, design and edit the books in collaboration with the artists, recognizing that their insight is integral to creating truly great books. In consequence, each book is unique, taking its form according to the innate requirements of each artist's body of work. For many ZERO+ titles, another level of artistry is revealed with the creation of custom-made deluxe box editions, each of which includes original works of art. This has led to a number of gallery exhibitions focused on combining these unique published editions with the artists' original paintings, photographs and drawings. To date, the imprint has produced over 60 limited editions, clamshells and deluxe box sets featuring artists from around the world—many with ties to Los Angeles—who are trailblazers in the fields of urban art, graffiti, pop surrealism, fine art painting, and photography.

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
